Laugh, and Again I Say, Laugh!

When was the last time you really laughed? Can you remember when you doubled over and laughed until the tears ran and your sides ached? The heaviness of spirit felt by so many of us over the last couple of years has not lent itself to easy laughter. There have been multiple difficulties for individuals and families; daily news reports have focused on dark and ominous issues and events. Perhaps you have had a significant personal loss and continue to grieve; laughter and joy are distant memories.

However, joy and laughter are gifts from God. A firm conviction in the good purposes of our God means that we trust Him through dark times as well as times of comparative ease. Our crushing and bruising experiences produce a sweet harvest of joy and faith as we yield to God's plan and purpose. The times of trial and pain increase our faith in God, and as He heals our wounds, we are able to laugh again.

Sarah's years of grieving barrenness gave way to joyful and infectious laughter after the birth of her son, Isaac. Sarah credited God as the source of her joy (Genesis 21:6, KJV).

The Jewish exiles in Babylon had ample reason to mourn. They had been forcibly removed from their homeland; loved ones had been killed; and they were at the mercy of captors who mocked them, demanding mirth and song. With agony, they questioned how it could be possible to sing the Lord's song in a strange land (Psalm 137, KJV). Compounding their anguish was the realization that the painful circumstances were the result of their sin being judged by God. After many years of captivity, when God brought the Jewish people home again, they rejoiced with exuberant laughter and shouts of joy (Psalm 126, KJV). God had restored hope and blessed with abundance. There is a time to weep, but there is also a time to laugh (Ecclesiastes 3:4, KJV).

Pat Scott gave a great reminder of the importance of laughter when she shared a humorous story with the Praying Grannies group; she said that she and her son had read the story a number of times and laughed helplessly each time. Rejoice!! Be merry! Laugh! Read jokes; share them with family and friends. Listen as a family member with a gift for humor describes the mishaps of her day. Watch a funny video. We can laugh at the human condition; we all have "oops!" moments, and we share the common experiences of being human and living in a fallen, albeit oftentimes funny, world.

Sometimes we can be intentional in seeking out humor; other times it is the unexpected story, quip, or incident which compels us to laugh. We may find different circumstances amusing, but we also understand that a situation may bring pain or embarrassment to another person; consider their feelings before laughing. Conversely, our laughter may be balm and a blessing to a bruised spirit. "A merry heart doeth good like medicine ..." (Proverbs 17:22a, KJV).

In Heaven, there will be no sin, no "oops" moments, no errors, and no confusion. God, who created us with the capacity for laughter, will endow us with fulness of joy. Perhaps that joy will spill over into peals of laughter, as we enjoy and worship our Savior forever. "Thou wilt show me the path of life: in Thy presence is fullness of joy; at Thy right hand there are pleasures forevermore." (Psalm 16:11, KJV)

It's Time for Pumpkins

Diane says that this recipe is an old favorite and is good to serve to a crowd to make the desserts go further. It is also a nice addition to serve with traditional pumpkin pie at Thanksgiving.

Pumpkin Raisin Bars

Ingredients for bars:

- 2 c. flour
- 2 c. sugar
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp nutmeg
- ½ tsp salt
- ½ tsp cloves
- 1 c. oil
- 4 eggs
- 1 can pumpkin
- ½ c. chopped nuts
- ½ c. raisins

Frosting:

- 1/3 c. butter
- 3 oz. cream cheese
- 2 c. powdered sugar
- 1 T milk
- 1 tsp vanilla

Heat oven to 350°. Grease 15 X 10 X 1 baking pan. Combine all ingredients except nuts and raisins. Beat at low speed until moistened, then 2 minutes at medium speed. Stir in nuts and raisins. Pour into greased pan. Bake 25-30 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool completely. For frosting: In small bowl combine all frosting ingredients. Beat until smooth. Frost cooled bars. Store in refrigerator.

Option: to make a cake, use a 9 X 13-inch pan and bake 40-50 minutes.
